The winners from the primary schools that took part, their parents and teachers were invited to attend. Student ambassadors from


F1 helped at reception desks, gave out name tags and showed our guests to their seats. The ceremony

started with a talk delivered by Dr. Mak on English writing skills. Dr Mak talked about how important it is to include feelings and thoughts in stories and to do this we need lots of adjectives. She then showed us samples from well written books. Even with her busy schedule, she kindly accepted our request for an interview after the ceremony.

R: Good afternoon, Dr. Mak. We are reporters of the KCC STANDARD. Could we ask you a few questions?

M: Sure

- R: How do you find Hong Kong students' English standard?
- M: I think it's quite okay, just that, you know, some people think that the English proficiency level of the students is not very good. But I don't find that as a great big difference between the past and now. So, I would say that, you know...they are good, but there's still room for improvement. But as compared to other countries like, for example, Thailand and probably Singapore, the students have been learning English for the same number of years, I think, as the Hong Kong students. I feel that their standard is probably a bit higher than Hong Kong students. This is how I feel.
- R: The second question is, what are the common mistakes Hong Kong students make in their writing?
- M:1 think mostly fragments. You know what fragments are? Like, for example, you

have 'hotdogs and hamburgers', and then you put a full stop afterwards. So it's not a complete sentence. And we do have a lot of comma-blinds. That is, you tend to put comma, comma all the time without a full stop. And, thirdly, I think that has to do with... probably dangling modifier. Have you heard of dangling modifiers?

R: No

- M: Dangling modifiers is like, for example, if you have, like... let me think, 'looking at him, the teacher felt that he was worried.'

 But the thing is, if you have 'looking at him', you should have the subject that follows but they don't have the subject, instead they have another wrong subject afterwards, so this is a dangling modifier. I find that, you know, students tend to make a lot of mistakes in dangling modifiers as well.
- R: Ok, so the last question is, do you have any tips for our students on how to improve our writing?
- M:Um... I think that, um, students don't get to use English outside class. I think it's better if they use more English outside class, for



example, they can talk to their classmates in English, they can listen to some... you know, music or watch TV, you know, listen to some radio channels whatever, but the most important thing is being able to use English outside class because at the moment I think that you tend to stop right there. In the classroom you may use a lot of English, but outside class, you don't get to use any English at all and this would be a problem I think. So if you want to improve, I think that the more you use English outside class, the better you will be. This is how I feel.

- R: Thank you for your time, so it is the end of our interview.
- M: Thank you.







After the interview, we did some research based on Dr Mak's comments to let our students have a better understanding.

To sum up Dr. Mak's feelings towards common errors made by Hong Kong students, we understand that they are mainly mistakes in sentence structures. Many students write fragments instead of complete sentences. We know that in certain types of writing, such as in speeches and to bring out a certain effect, it is acceptable to use fragments; yet in most writings, we should avoid using incomplete sentences. In fact, it is not difficult to write a simple sentence because it consists of just a noun and a verb, for example, 'He cried.' Missing either the noun, as in here, 'he' or the verb 'cried' and no matter how long it is, the chunk of words is still not considered a sentence.

The same with the use of commas, we should be very careful while using commas. Without a full stop, the sentence becomes much too long and it is often called a 'run-on sentence' which

is as poorly written, if not worse, as a fragment.

The part about dangling modifiers, too, involves sentence structure and word order. Modifiers are words, phrases, or clauses that add description. In clear sentences, you find modifiers right next to, either in front of or behind, the target words they describe. Read this example:

✓ Disappointed, the teacher took away the expensive mobile phone from John, who had been playing with it for a long time.

Note that 'disappointed' precedes 'the teacher', its target, just as 'expensive' is placed right before 'mobile phone'. The clause 'who had been playing with it for a long time' follows 'John', its target. However, a writer that is inexperienced may have a modifier but forget the target. The modifier therefore dangles because the noun the modifier describes does not exist.

Dangling modifiers are errors that confuse readers. Look at the sample below:

X With disappointment, the expensive dress was returned to the rack.

If you look carefully, you do not find anyone in the sentence feeling disappointed because neither 'a dress' nor 'a rack' has emotions. You often need to add something to the sentence so that the modifier finally has a target word to describe:

✓ With disappointment, Maria returned the expensive dress to the rack.

Let's look at another example:

X Scrubbing the tiles with bleach and an old toothbrush, the stains began to fade.

Again, you do not find anyone in the sentence scrubbing the tiles because stains cannot scrub themselves. To fix the problem, you should organize the sentence like this:

✓ Scrubbing the tiles with bleach and an old toothbrush, the helper removed the stains on them.

To answer our last question in regard to English standard, Dr Mak thinks that Hong Kong students are quite good although we are a bit behind from Thailand or Singapore.

Shortly after talking to Dr Mak, we felt that more schools should organize this kind of writing competition and invite experts like her to give feedback. If more schools are doing this, we can learn from outside class like she said. Maybe this is one way to catch up with our counterparts in nearby cities.

Adjectives: the key to vivid description

Based on Dr Mak's suggestion on writing stories by putting in lots of thoughts and descriptions with the use of adjectives, we invited some of the upper form students to show us through a paragraph that describes their journey to school. Most of us know that adjectives are one-word as in 'impatient', 'irritating', 'vibrant', 'wonderful' and many more. We also noticed that they can be in phrases such as 'in tidy school uniform', 'in a great spirit' or 'full of energy'. We are therefore convinced that adjectives are the key to a vivid description of many kinds of writing especially for stories.

My Journey to School

Studying Smart

We did our research on how to study with no sweat and stress before our exam and hopefully we could benefit from it and tried out in our exam that came after. Actually this puts them at the risk of falling ill because our body's immune system becomes weak due to the fact that by cramming our work within a short period of time leads to lack of sleep, change of routine pattern of food intake, and deprivation of rest time. Of course in order to gain high marks in exam, we cannot avoid devoting our time on revision. There is no free lunch in this world. If studying hard for exam is inevitable, how can we minimize the bad effect our exams bring us? This is the purpose of our research and we do hope it will help you to stop letting exam stress affecting your academic performance.

Test yourself:

Read a chapter once and test yourself. Instead of reading the same chapter three times, it is more efficient if you minimize the time of reading and add an additional part which can test how much you understand or memorize. You can play the teacher and write up a list of questions your teacher may probably ask you. Or you can ask your classmate to be one. This way you are studying with a companion and work as a team. Playing the teacher helps you focus on what you think is more important and this surely helps us avoid the

less important bits and enables us to memorize the more important information.

Listen to music

We suggest you trying out for a minor test or dictation, in case it may not work that well for you. Studies show that people who listen to classical music while studying perform better. It is believed that the complex structure and rhythms of the music can activate parts of the brain that coordinate both rational and creative thoughts. It also puts us in a more relaxed mood to do our revision.

Summarize it

After reading a few pages, try to summarize what you have studied in a few sentences. You can write it out or highlight the part in your notes that summarize the pages. This not only helps you memorize better, it also prepares you for quick review in the future.

Break up study time

Try the 45/15 rule: in every hour, study for 45 minutes and take 15 minutes off. You can absorb information best if you do this for 3 hours. While taking the break, try things like checking your emails or clearing up your desk instead of playing computer games. Do things that will not make you tired but further release you from your stress.

Rule of thumb

The best way to study is, after our research, leisurely read your notes after lesson every day. Read them again the next day, a week later, a month later, and after 3 months to make them lifelong memory. Would you like to try? An Interview with Ms Cheung Suet Man on Learning I.S. in English Chui Ka Sin Doris (F5B)

- R: Reporter C: Ms Cheung
- R: We heard that Integrated Science of F.1 next year will be taught in English. Will there be any difficulties that we can foresee now?
- **C:** Students may find it difficult to learn the concepts, as there is plenty of science-specific terminology. Students do not use these terms in ordinary life and have fewer opportunities to use them. I think that we should improve our English by listening and speaking in English more in daily life. So, students may need to spend more time learning English if implementation of teaching certain topics with English will be done.

- 2. Flatten and paste the U-shaped
- **3.** The bottom of carnations is not fully bloomed, so we should penetrate the steel wire before bending it into a U-shape.
- 4. Imitation leaves are also pasted onto the U-shaped wire.
- 5. Wait for about three minutes until the floral leaves have dried out.
- 6. Place the flowers into a small bowl after they are gracefully positioned, add ribbons for decoration.
