





Mr. Freeman Lau is a renowned local designer whose works received a myriad of awards. His passion in Art and the message behind each and every one of his works is so enriching and so unique. Having Mr. Lau guide us through his journey of success in his exhibition, 'Freeman Lau and Design: Inter-dependent Decisions,' was a once-in-a-lifetime experience. On 10th January, we were among the many visitors there in his exhibition at the Hong Kong Heritage Museum in Sha Tin. His image as a respectable famous designer was at times mingled with his other roles as a caring father and a loving husband, through the way he presented his works to us with sincere and humorous remarks that sparkled warmth and laughter throughout our tour.











We were amazed not only by the beauty of his works, but also the messages they convey as we toured around the exhibition hall. The way they were grouped under a theme made so much more sense to us. 

The cap of the bottle actually serves as a cup and the shape is for an easy and comfortable grip. Other designs such as the use of chairs interlocked in different ways express the merging of beautiful and traditional materials with innovative presentation of lines and shapes in order to express a message, for example, our relationship with the Mainland, or how an individual adjusts to social and political changes. With such missions, his chairs are sturdy and comfortable to be utilized, turning an ordinary piece of furniture into an art form and vice versa.

Ingredients such as wood and bamboos are Mr. Lau's favorites for their unique textures, and something he enjoys exploring and building on. From his attitude we got an insight and that is we should not omit the importance of raw ingredients. If you like painting, maybe you should start digging out facts about the different kinds of paint such as the difference between oil paint and acrylic. If you like cooking, maybe you want to find out more about honey or cheese, or spices in India. There is so much more than just the end products to focus on and that makes a lot more fun. Research on How to Write a Personal Statement Message from the Chief Editor

Some of the upper form students may want to know how to write up a good personal statement for Jupas requirement and some may prefer to write it in English. you are about to read may be helpful. However, whether it be in

What you are about to read may be helpful. However, whether it be in English or Chinese does not actually make that much of a difference provided that you obtain a good result in the HKDSE. But then again, it doesn't hurt to know the basic scaffolding and some of the registers of this text type, for there is a high chance that you are required to write something like this for university applications overseas. What follows is a personal statement for someone interested in the Faculty of Media and Communications.

(Note #1: The first paragraph can be your insight or anything you know about the subject you want to apply for and why you are applying. It should be well written and therefore you should spend some time doing some short research beforehand; otherwise it won't be impressive enough.)

With the fast speed made possible by the Internet world, the media has become so powerful and effective that what happens somewhere arouses immediate response from places thousands of miles away. Our interaction with others has become boundless, neither restricted by time nor space. This freedom enables us to reach the world right at our desk and communication takes place within seconds. Such a human invention to me is the greatest among all others, for the fact that our message travels at a speed no one could ever have imagined, and exchange of information takes place in split seconds. That's what amazes me: to engage myself in this field, whether for academic pursuit or for career advancement.

(Note #2: The second paragraph should be about why you are the right candidate; the points below can be one paragraph each, or all put in one or two paragraphs, or in point form but each further

explained in complete <u>sentences</u>. Also note that these points may vary depending on the faculty you are applying to).

I am an appropriate applicant for a place in the Faculty of Media and Communications at your University for the following reasons:

(Note #3: The third paragraph shows your <u>determination</u>, your strong interest, etc., in the subject you choose, for further studies, or for future advancement).

The years I spent... and the time I was engaged in... have also made me a more dynamic person (who is) able to see things from various perspectives. ... I am aware of what I want and therefore will go all the way for it.

(Note #4: The above is a suggested framework. Remember your personal statement has to be unique. If any phrases or sentences are shared among some of your writings, you will be suspected of plagiarism and that could be the worst scenario. You are advised to grab the main idea of what to write, its basic structure, the type of language or register, etc., and after that, write your own without referring to this again until you finish writing. This would ensure you won't use the same wordings. Isolated words or certain phrases can be used but not in chunks to avoid suspicion of plagiarism.)






Take time to be thankful for everything that you have. You can always have more, but you could also have less.

For example, "The star can't shine without darkness" teaches students not to be afraid to undergo difficulties. Whatever hardship you face, don't give up because once you conquer it you can shine brighter than you have ever imagined. What I found most appropriate is an illustration for the

quote, "Take time to be thankful for everything that you have. You can always have more, but you could also have less." There is a silhouette of a father carrying a child on his shoulders where the father has his neck stretched as far as he could reach to the back, towards his son, who is sitting on his shoulders, and the son leaning downward to where his father is. They are like a unity and they value each other so much that all they see is nothing but appreciation of what they have – they have each other.

These words of wisdom also include, "I never dreamed about success. I worked for it" by Estee Lauder and "Most of the problems in life are because of two reasons: We act without thinking or we keep thinking without acting," or "The only thing achieved in life without effort is failure," by anonymous writers. Good People Good Deeds

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An Interview with Ms Chow Kit Sum

Do you think you're a good person? There are many ways to dedicate your kindness to others and show your generosity. The most common one is by doing volunteer work. How much do you know about it? We were honored to have Miss Chow, who is responsible for promoting volunteer work in our school, to talk about 'Good Deeds'. Our reporters Olivia Mak and Karen Fung have interviewed her earlier.

- C: Miss Chow O: Olivia Mak K: Karen Fung
- K: Well, Miss Chow. We are so glad that you're available to meet us. I think promoting volunteer work is meaningful. May I ask you to use a word to describe volunteer work?
- C: Sure. There are actually two words that I can think of. The first one is 'hardship'. I believe most of us see volunteer work as donating time and I can't argue about it. Volunteer work sometimes is no different from a 'job not paid' if we put into consideration that volunteers might need to work hard for hours. Physical work like transporting things or decorating stalls could be required, not to mention that sometimes we need to pay visit to the elders for over eight hours. So the word 'hardship' can concisely and precisely describe it. Another word is 'happiness'. The duty of the volunteers is to share love and give warmth. I think we all have heard of that saying, 'Giving is receiving'. That's why dedicating our time to the people in need brings us joy and happiness. What's more, we feel more connected to society and satisfied.
- K: I couldn't agree more on this. Do you like promoting these activities?
- C: Absolutely! It means quite a lot to me. At the beginning, there were not many voluntary activities. So students were so interested in those events. In order to raise their awareness, I collected more and more information on the Net. That's one reason why we have so many events today. At least it appeals to students now. I find a lot of students are keen on passing happiness to people. Some join it because of peer influence.

- O: Sounds like you love your job! After joining those activities, what feedback do students usually give? What do you think they learn from it?
- C: I think the most common feedback that I receive is that they can communicate with people of different ages. As they spend most of their time at school, they don't really have much time to meet people outside. Working as a volunteer involves facing different people; for instance, the disabled and the disadvantaged children with whom they learn to be careful when talking. Students not only learn to listen and communicate with people of different ages, they can also learn from their experiences. I can really see that they act more maturely after that. They become more sophisticated too.
- O: Indeed, we learn a lot from it. As you mentioned, students change quite a lot after. Can you share with us who has the most obvious changes? Or is there anything special you may want to tell us?
- C: Well, they may not have 'big changes'. However, I can see that they show their other side which is not how they behave at school. Some students might not be good at studies, but when it comes to volunteer work, they are really passionate about it. People from other organizations also praise our students. They behave well. A student who has left school now has a really special experience. He was once an introvert. Invited by his friends, he once went flag selling. At the very beginning, he found it hard to ask around as it required courage. After a while, he became more willing to talk. The heavier the flag bag was, the more satisfied he felt. Gradually, he has turned into an extrovert. This experience of his is vividly imprinted in my mind.
- O: I have some schoolmates who share similar experiences. Can you tell us the most memorable experience?
- C: I think it's a visit to the elderly home that I've had recently. I ask for students' reviews every time. You know, visiting the elders gives you an avalanche of fun stories. Still, the most memorable thing I have is something said by a student. In the beginning, he said he had had no idea about what to say in that 20 minute phase because he thought it was way too long. After that, he told me that 20 minutes was never enough as he had a lot to say. He also mentioned that he wanted to talk to his grandmother right after the event, that he didn't want his grandmother to feel lonely. Sometimes volunteer work reminds them of their family too.
- O: That seems to be a very typical outcome. I think that's all! Again, thank you so much for giving us a chance to interview you!

Hover Board Segway Steven (4C)





In the past several months, you might have seen people riding a 2 wheel hover board or self-balancing electric scooter around. There are a few names for it, but it doesn't matter. What is more important is that it is fun to ride on. It takes a while

Many of you are probably curious as to how this cool gadget stabilizes itself as we step on it. Here's the answer: A tilt sensor right next to the wheel sends a signal to the gyroscope depending on how far we are leaning forward. The gyroscopes relay this information to the logic board. A logic board is a component that processes everything that goes on inside and outside of the board such as receiving signals, and controlling the speed of the scooter. The logic board receives information from the sensors which detect our movements. Then, the logic board sends a signal to the electric motors which are mounted right next to the wheels, ultimately causing the wheels to turn.
