
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Our Whole School Approach to Enhance the Use of English across Curriculum

The MOI of NSS curriculum will be in line with the Junior Form curriculum. More subjects taught in English will be introduced at F.4 level starting in 2018 – 19. They are BAFS, Science (Biology/Chemistry), Mathematics, etc.



Inter-house Mathematics competition (Junior Forms)



1. To provide students with sufficient and interesting science-related reading materials, like increasing the stock of English science books, magazines and films in the school library





English-medium extended learning activities (ELA)

Under the Fine-tuning the Medium of Instruction" arrangement, starting from 2011/12, Englishmedium Extended Learning Activities (ELA) have been conducted in all junior forms nonlanguage subjects with a proportion of 25% of the total lesson time. Materials developed from the Refined English Enhancement Scheme (REES) will be applied to other classes in F.1 from 2015/16 and other subjects of the Junior Forms to increase students' exposure to English in their learning. For these subjects, the assessment paper consists of 10-20% of questions in English.



Our Junior English curriculum

With the focus on reading and infusion of language arts elements, the junior curriculum exposes students to numerous English activities. At the same time, the foundation on vocabulary and sentence structures is strengthened and gradually prepares students for the senior forms. Students seem to be addicted to reading books (this is a good thing). The junior curriculum evolves over time to involve more activities that challenge students.

Drama lesson

- Our English classes infuse drama elements into oral lessons for the junior forms which is co-taught by one Native speaking English teacher (NET) and one local English teacher (LET).
- This exposes students to different kinds of literature, novels, and myths allowing students to explore their personal interests.
- Students analyze drama scripts, learn important acting skills such as voice projection, pronunciation
 and other skills to prepare them for upcoming performances.
- Shyness is often a barrier to learning a new language, however drama allows students to break free from their shyness.
- Drama is a great platform for students to practise their speaking skills as a presenter and also their listening skills as the audience.
- When students are engaged in a fun activity they immerse themselves into the learning process.









Saturday Day Camp

The objective of the camp is to help build students' interest in English with various activities that differ from their daily classes. Activities include project based activities, listening and speaking worksheets, in-class debates, and drama performances.

During the camp, two of our school's NETs cater for one class allowing students to have more interactions and engagement in the classroom. The day camp is offered to all students from the junior Forms. Form 1 to Form 3 students are expected to attend the English Saturday day camp in hopes of improving their English in a more casual setting.

The teachers were very helpful. They helped me review for different things such as vocabulary, speaking and drama skills. Actually the day camp is a chance to learn in a relaxing way.



Small class teaching


Classes are split into small groups according to ability. The smaller teacher-to-student ratio allows better guidance for individuals with different approaches to encourage students to put into practice what they learn.
